Specifications for Rubber Blankets.

To be forty-five (45) by seventy-two (72) inches of sixteen (16) by sixteen (16) sheeting, coated with rubber, luster finish.

To have eighteen (18) brass grommets (one-quarter (14) inch inside diameter) inserted along the edges, and arranged so as to show four (4) on each end, six (6) on one side, and eight (8) on the other side, as per standard sample. The grommets on one side and end to be inserted two (2) inches from center to edge of blanket, and on the other side and end one (1) inch from center to edge of blanket, which is to have a flat rubber ribbon binding one-half (36) inch wide all around. Each grommet to be reinforced with the rubber fabric one and one-half (11/2) inches square.

Average weight of blanket to be two and one-half (21/2) pounds. Material, workmanship, and finish to conform to standard sample.
